CDC	Health	FY 2014- FY 2015	The project "Expansion and Strengthening of Clinical Based HIV Related Services in Haiti under the President's Emergency Plan for AIDS Relief (PEPFAR)" disbursed \$1,914,900 to assess the organizational and technical capacity of the 5 Points of Services (PPS) which were part of a network in order to ensure the provision of care for human immunodeficiency virus (HIV)/tuberculosis (TB). In addition, this project strengthened laboratory services with personnel, equipment and facilities. The local partner was Centres Pour le Developpement et la Sante (CDS).
CDC	Health	FY 2016- FY 2019	A continuation of the project above disbursed \$4,352,747 to support delivery of high-quality HIV prevention, care, and treatment, primary care, and maternal health services in the target geographic areas within the Northeast and West departments of Haiti. The local partner was again CDS.
CDC	Health	FY 2015- FY 2016	<p>The project "Strengthening and Expanding HIV/AIDS Treatment, Care and Support for High Risks Groups/Commercial Sex Workers and Their Associated Partners in the Republic of Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$1,671,339 to 1) reinforce and increase access to screening and treatment of Sexually Transmitted Infections (STI) and HIV screening for 90% of all vulnerable and high-risk groups including migrants, within a comprehensive package of integrated prevention services; and 2) reinforce and increase access to care and treatment of HIV/AIDS, and support services to 100% of HIV (+) vulnerable and high-risk populations, within the networks of the local partner, Fondation pour la Santé Reproductrice et de l'Education Familiale (FOSREF).</p> <p>The project "Improvement of Integrated HIV Clinical Based Services (Counselling and Testing, Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission (PMTCT), TB/HIV, Care and Treatment) in the Select Sites in Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$6,014,107 for Groupe Haitien d'Etude de Sarcome de Kaposi et d'Infections Opportunistes (GHESKIO) to: 1) continue strengthening primary prevention of HIV through the Voluntary Counseling and Testing (VCT) Center and the project for PMTCT at GHESKIO, Institut des Maladies Infectieuses et de Santé de la Reproduction (IMIS), Siguenneau (SS) and the National Penitentiary (NP); 2) increase care and treatment of HIV/AIDS, STIs and other opportunistic infections at GHESKIO Institut National de Laboratoire et de Recherches (INRL), and GHESKIO IMIS and Siguenneau and National Penitentiary; 3) strengthen the capacity of Haiti to collect and use surveillance data and manage national AIDS programs to ongoing mentoring and training by expanding HIV/STI/TB Surveillance programs and strengthening lab support for surveillance, diagnosis, treatment, disease monitoring and HIV screening or blood safety.</p> <p>A related project, "Improvement of Integrated HIV Clinical Based Services (Counselling and Testing, Prevention of Mother to Child Transmission, TB/HIV, Care and Treatment) Through Financial and Technical Assistance to Centers of Excellence in Haiti under PEPFAR," disbursed \$11,030,717 for GHESKIO to: 1) achieve primary prevention of HIV (counselling, testing, evidence-based behavioral changes, PMTCT), including in high risk populations with an improved comprehensive primary care; 2) improve HIV/AIDS, STI, OIs including TB treatment/care, diagnosis capacity; and 3) mentor training and supervision for the Ministry of Health GHESKIO network and strengthen the capacity of sites to collect and use surveillance data for the national program.</p> <p>The project "Strengthening HIV/AIDS Prevention Care and Treatment Referral Services to Targeted Populations Engaged in High-Risk Behavior in Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$1,071,637 for Promoteurs Objectifs ZeroSida (POZ) to reduce HIV-related mortality and morbidity among People Living With HIV/AIDS (PLWHA) and Men Having Sex with Men (MSM).</p>

CDC	Health	FY 2017- FY 2021	<p>The project "Strengthening and Expanding HIV/AIDS Treatment, Care and Support for Prostitutes and Their Associated Sexual Partners in the Republic of Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$9,849,827 to build on existing PEPFAR-supported activities to ensure adequate access to HIV/AIDS screening, care, and treatment to key populations, and other high-risk vulnerable groups, including youth. This program provided direct HIV clinical services and collaborated with other key stakeholders to develop strategies to reduce stigma and discrimination. FOSREF designed strategies and implemented activities to improve HIV prevention services and expand access to stigma-free HIV care and treatment services for key populations.</p> <p>The project "Strengthening HIV Clinical Services within a Network of Public and Private Health Institutions in the West, South, and North West Departments of Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$16,968,146 to provide financial and technical assistance to support direct delivery of integrated HIV clinical-based services including HIV testing and counseling (HTC); PMTCT; pediatric and adult HIV care and treatment services; and TB prevention, diagnosis, and treatment services. Building on existing PEPFAR-supported HIV services and other USG supported health programs, and following the new PEPFAR Haiti goal and strategic orientation, these funds will support a network of public and private health institutions in the West, South, and North West departments to sustain the delivery of high quality integrated clinical services. This network of public and private health institutions is comprised of: Hôpital Bernard Mevs, Centre Hospitalier d'Arcachon 32, Centre Hospitalier Eliazar Germain, Hôpital de la Communauté Haitienne, Hôpital de Fermathe, Institut de Dermatologie et des Maladies Infectieuses, Sanatorium de Port-au-Prince, CHAPI, Centre de Santé Saint-Michel de Fontamara, Hôpital Wesleyen de la Gonâve, Mennonite de Croix-des-Bouquets, Hôpital Notre-Dame de Petit-Goâve, Hôpital Immaculée Conception des Cayes, Hôpital Evangélique de Bombardopolis, and Sanatorium de Sigueneau.</p> <p>The project "Reinforcing Capacity at Two Centers of Excellence to Sustain the Delivery of Comprehensive HIV Clinical Services in Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$18,623,966 to support INLR and IMIS to continue to deliver and expand integrated HIV clinical-based services in Port-au-Prince, Haiti through: HIV prevention services through the provision of HTC and PMTCT; pediatric and adult HIV care and treatment services with a particular emphasis on early antiretroviral therapy (ART) initiation, adherence monitoring, retention on treatment, and viral load monitoring; prevention, diagnosis and treatment services for TB and multidrug-resistant tuberculosis (MDR-TB); and support to the national TB and HIV program in increasing related diagnosis capacity (viral load, drug resistance and susceptibility testing, culture) within their reference Laboratory.</p>
CDC	Health	FY 2020- FY 2022	<p>The project "Clinical and Public Health Curriculum Development, Training, and Information Systems Support for the Haitian Health Care System under PEPFAR" disbursed \$6,885,364 for Centre Haitien pour le Renforcement du Systeme de Sante (CHARESS) to build upon and improve: service delivery by providing technical assistance in the Ministry of Public Health and Population of Haiti (MSPP) network to help strengthen HIV/AIDS-related services through clinical mentoring; health workforce development by supporting both pre-service and in-service training efforts and working with MSPP in maintaining its national clinical guidelines; and health information systems by enhancing the Santé Plus system, which includes patient care summaries, population-level data dashboards, automated program reports, epidemiological monitoring, and indicator reporting, and is linked to computerized lab results.</p>

The Notice of Funding Opportunity seeks to facilitate this goal by reengineering the health information system (HIS) and 1) increasing its use as a monitoring tool for continuity and quality of care; 2) to strengthen public health surveillance for early detection of outbreaks; and 3) to improve the capacity to respond to complex health emergencies. Lastly, this project will improve the GOH's ability to monitor health outcomes including natality and mortality by improving the National Vital Registry system.</p> <p>The FOSREF Project for Comprehensive Access to HIV/AIDS Care and Treatment, and Prevention Services for Key Populations in Haiti Under PEPFAR disbursed \$2,573,333 for FOSREF to improve condom and pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) use for prevention, case identification, linkage to and retention in care, adherence to ART and viral suppression.</p> <p>The "Comprehensive HIV/AIDS Service Delivery Programs in Haiti under PEPFAR" disbursed \$5,111,049 for GHESKIO to support GOH Strategic Plans for HIV and TB service delivery. Recipient(s) will implement comprehensive HIV prevention, care and treatment by 1) identifying HIV-positive adults and children through facility provider-initiated testing and counseling (PITC); 2) performing community HIV testing and counseling with prompt linkage to treatment; 3) conducting treatment adherence monitoring; 4) performing differentiated service delivery models for treatment retention; and 5) conducting routine clinical and viral load (VL) monitoring for eventual HIV epidemic control.</p> <p>The project "Comprehensive HIV Service Delivery Programs in the Central Plateau and lower-Artibonite regions of Haiti" disbursed \$1,932,525 for Zanmi Lasante (ZL) to support GOH Strategic Plans for HIV and TB service delivery, including comprehensive HIV prevention, care, and treatment by: 1) identifying HIV-positive adults and children through facility PITC; 2) performing community HIV testing and counseling with prompt linkage to treatment; 3) conducting treatment adherence monitoring; 4) performing differentiated service delivery models for treatment retention; and 5) conducting routine clinical and VL monitoring for eventual HIV epidemic control.</p>
DOD	Humanitarian Assistance	FY2016-FY2022	<p>During the period FY16-FY22, 25 USSOUTHCOM Humanitarian Assistance (HA) projects involved cases of local procurement representing an investment of \$570,826 in the local Haitian economy. These HA "minimal cost projects" constituted primarily the procurement of medical supplies, medical PPE, and disinfectants supporting COVID-19 mitigation. Other local procurement projects sought water pumps, transformers, public lighting systems, and construction materials supporting HA disaster preparedness, health, education, and basic infrastructure sectors.</p>
USAID	Democracy, Human Rights and Governance (DRG)	FY2018 - FY2022	<p>DRG works with various local organizations across its different activities; for instance, the Community Driven Development (CDD) activity is implemented through local partners, including the Institut de Formation et de Services (IFOS) and Papyrus. CDD is a PIO award implemented by Organization of the American States (OAS) / Pan American Development Foundation (PADF), and works to strengthen the capacities of local CBOs and MSMEs. The "A Shared Community For All" activity is implemented by a local organization – Engagement, Participation et Kapasite (ENPAK) – for \$1 million and works with a number of other local groups, including building the capacity of Disabled Persons Organizations (DPOs). In addition, DRG's anti-trafficking activity (BEST) and Elections and Political Processes Support activity worked with a number of local organizations.</p>

USAID	Economic Growth and Agricultural Development	FY2019 - FY2022	<p>USAID/Haiti's Office of Economic Growth and Agricultural Development (EGAD) recently completed three awards with a combined value of \$1.3 million with small-scale farmer groups/cooperatives (FONHDAD, AGCRDDM, SOHADERK). • The Haiti INVEST buy-in and the Atteindre activity target micro, small, and medium enterprises (MSME). Atteindre currently has 19 partner local organizations ranging from business advisory and workforce development service providers, to financial institutions, research firms, and local NGOs. The 19 subgrants are fully contracted by Atteindre, representing \$3.5 million USD and targeting 24,000 beneficiaries. Moreover, the Atteindre activity has reached 10,254 MSMEs. • Many of EGAD's activities are implemented by, and in close collaboration with, local organizations, universities, and associations. USDA/U.S. Forest Service	Humanitarian Assistance	FY2018-FY2019	In FY18 and FY19, the U.S. Forest Service spent approximately \$89,000 on local procurement for services from a company called Ayiti Nexus, which has worked with the U.S. Embassy on a variety of activities. USAID's Office of U.S. Foreign Disaster Assistance (USAID/OFDA), requested the U.S. Forest Service, International Programs (USFS) to provide technical assistance in review of the functionality of Emergency Operations Centers (EOC) in Haiti. One of the key findings of an earlier EOC assessment was a gap in EOC functionality due to a lack of a well-defined, communicated, and tested management system. Such a system would provide the basis for staff from a variety of Ministries and organizations to work together efficiently in the EOCs to manage information and resources to promote a coordinate disaster response. Throughout FY18 and FY19, the USFS program focused on developing EOC Standard Operating Procedures at the Department level, coupled with strengthening EOC operations and management. Activities with this objective included various workshops and courses, all requiring the support of logistics coordinators in Haiti. The logistics support included coordinating with USFS International Programs and in-country counterparts; providing recommendations for venues, food, transport, field logistics during scoping trips and trainings; arranging logistics for travel to and from event locations; and providing interpretation and translation services for the larger workshops.
